DID YOU KNOW . . . that First Parish Church now generates 89% of its electricity onsite and has reduced its natural gas consumption by 33% over the last year? We have done this by installing a 25kW (AC) solar system on our roof and switching to programmable thermostats (17 in all) in our building.



Worldwide scientific consensus is clear and overwhelming. Every single major university and institution of higher learning concurs. All of us must find ways to reduce our carbon emissions by 40% over the next decade and by 90% by 2050. For a growing number of people, this is not a political issue but rather an existential and moral one. It’s about being good stewards of the Creation and leaving a livable world for our children and grandchildren, as well as saving millions of species from going extinct.

First Parish Weston invites you to consider anew the ways you can lower your carbon footprint in 2022. Install a solar PV system, purchase “green power,” and/or drive an electric vehicle. Arrange for a home energy audit ([MassSave.com](https://www.masssave.com)) and support the adoption of climate friendly policies and legislation. Support local groups such as [www.metrowestclimatesolutions.org](https://www.metrowestclimatesolutions.org) and [www.sustainablewestonma.org](https://www.sustainablewestonma.org) These are just a few ideas. There’s many more.

He was born in an obscure village and grew up in another. He was a humble carpenter for perhaps 30 years and then an itinerant preacher for three.

He never wrote a book or owned a home. He never held an office, never had a family of his own and never went to college. He never raised an army, never set foot in a big city and never travelled two hundred miles from where he was born.

He gathered a little group of friends around him and taught them his way of life based on the Jewish Scriptures.

While still a young man, popular feeling turned against him. His friends ran away. One denied him and another betrayed him.

He was turned over to the authorities and endured the mockery of a trial. He was nailed to a cross between two thieves. While he was dying, his executioners gambled on the only thing he owned, a cloak. His body was laid in a borrowed grave by the kindness of a friend.

Twenty centuries have passed. All the armies that ever marched, all the navies that ever sailed, all the parliaments that ever sat, and all the kings that ever reigned, put together, have not influenced humankind as has this one solitary man.

Regardless of what you believe or don't believe about this man, his vision for this world, the coming Kingdom of God, was real and powerful – and it still is.
