REFLECTION: "Communion in an Uncertain World" Rev. Jeff Barz-Snell

COMMUNION RITUAL

Note: First Parish Weston has a practice of hospitality in all our rituals. If you would like to participate in our communion service, you are welcome to do so. You are also welcome to come forward and simply receive a blessing. For those who wish to participate, we will be moving "counter-clockwise" in a circle from your seats. Please approach "on the right" and receive the gift of bread first, and then move to the left to receive the gift of wine, before returning to your seat.

The prophet Jesus, who was born in Nazareth of Judea, and who was crucified and died outside the walls of Jerusalem in a final witness to his faith, and in the hope of bringing closer that final harmony of all things with the Divine (which he called "the Kingdom of God"), left no written record of his preaching. His sayings were preserved among his followers and among the common people and were finally written down in narrative versions of his life and message called Gospels, or "Good News."

Minister:

From the Gospel according to Matthew we have these words:

Come unto me, all ye that labor and are heavily laden, and I will give you rest. Take my yoke upon you and learn of me; for I am gentle and lowly in heart: and you shall find rest for your souls. For my yoke is easy and my burden is light.

We are not gathered here today because we have dared give up our life to live in faith, or because we ever willingly take up the crosses we bear in order to follow Jesus. We are here because his words and his example are an inspiration in our lives. Thus, like the millions of women and men who have preceded us, we find in remembering him an inducement to a greater sense of connectedness with All That Is, a feeling nearer akin to wholeness than we are often privileged to enjoy, and a renewed hope in the possibilities of a larger fellowship and a more caring community.

Let us join in saying together the prayer Jesus taught us to pray:

Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy name. Thy kingdom come, thy will be done, on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread and forgive us our trespasses as we forgive those who trespass against us. Lead us not into temptation but deliver us from evil, for Thine is the kingdom and the power and the glory forever. Amen.

All peoples through all time have considered with wonder and awe the mystery of life and growth and have found symbols to express our reverence for the forces of life and ways to celebrate our dependence on the nurturing earth. Bread and wine are such symbols, and Communion is a way of celebrating both the gifts we are given and the creativity we can bring to using them.

Jesus and his followers shared bread and wine at their last meal together,

Jesus used the bread and the wine as symbols of the liberation that his own sacrifice would mean to those who understood it. He took bread, and he poured wine, and he said

"This do in remembrance of me."

Let us break bread together and share the cup of wine in remembrance of Jesus, as he asked.

Let us remember also all those men and women who toil in all the many kinds of fields and vineyards, who labor and are heavy laden, and be reminded that these elements need to be for us symbols of liberation. Let us remember that what we do here is a ritual act of sharing, and that in coming together we join with our sisters and brothers of every race and faith, for we all seek meaning in the midst of mystery, and we all find that which is worthy of our profoundest awe. We call it many names, but the sense that we are part of an inconceivably vaster whole is a feeling we all share.

In a moment of quiet reflection, I now invite us to pause for a moment to offer a prayer of concern or gratitude for someone or something that is on our hearts and minds this morning. **Amen.**

Distribution of the Elements:

Dear friends, the same night in which he was betrayed, we are told that Jesus took bread, and when he had given thanks, he broke it and said: "This is my body which is broken for you. This do in remembrance of me."

After the same manner, he also took a cup when he supped, saying, this is the new testament in my blood. This do ye, as oft as you drink it, in remembrance of me.
